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IN 1990, fifteen years after the Chicago Literary Club published its centennial volume, *The First Hundred Years: 1874-1974*, the Club published a supplement to the centennial volume. The purpose of the supplement was to update the appendices in the centennial book, making them current through May 1989, and also to recount some of the Club's activities during that fifteen-year period in question. Ten years later, to mark its 125th anniversary, the Club published a book further updating the appendices. It also contained information about the Club's celebration of its 125th anniversary and, in a piece written by William E. Barnhart, included a description of Club activities and developments during the preceding twenty-five years. The title of that book is *The Chicago Literary Club: One Hundred Twenty-Five Years, 1874-1999.*

Fifteen seasons have now passed since the publication of the 125th anniversary book, and the board of directors of the Club has authorized the publication of another fifteen-year supplement. This supplement, covering the period June 1999 through May 2014, not only updates the relevant appendices, but also includes an essay by the Club's webmaster, Francis A. Lackner, Jr., about the Club's entry into the Internet age—arguably the most important Club development during the past fifteen years. Finally, in this foreword, there is presented an account of some of the Club's activities and other developments during this fifteen-year period.

At the start of the season following the celebration of its 125th anniversary (i.e., the season of 1999-2000), the Club's Resident membership was 128. Resident membership thereafter fluctuated between 121 and 146 until reaching 155 in 2011 and 159 in 2012, the highest number recorded for any year subsequent to that of the Club's 100th anniversary. These numbers were reached principally as a result of member-recruitment efforts initiated and led by Arthur

J. Diers, Stephen P. Thomas, and James E. Thompson. At the end of the 2013-14 season, the last season covered by this supplement, the Club boasted a Resident membership of 143. Of this number, 51 such Resident members were members the year of the Club's 125th anniversary and 10 were members at the time of its centennial year. Taking into account Non-resident members, these numbers would be 71 and 16, respectively. Eight of our current members four Resident and four Non-resident—have been members for fifty or more years.

Although the By-laws have long provided for a Resident membership cap of 250, to my knowledge the number of Resident members has never exceeded 220. Recent years, however, have shown a Resident membership of about 150 to be optimal, particularly in terms of the limited number of yearly opportunities for presenting papers. This base number has also been sufficient in recent years to produce Monday-evening turnouts ranging from twenty-five to thirty-five or more members and guests—numbers which are remarkable considering the frequency of our weekly meetings and which are also conducive to lively gatherings for drinks and dinner, conversation, and the evening's program.

Like their predecessors, current directors have struggled with questions about dues levels. When I became a member of the Club, in 1972, annual dues for Resident members were \$45. Dues were thereafter increased in small increments and reached \$175 for the 1994-95 season. In 1995, the board of directors, in the light of increasing expenses, considered raising annual dues to \$190. Instead, concerned that dues were reaching a level that discouraged membership in the Club, the directors decided to reduce annual dues from \$175 to \$150 and to institute a nominal charge for special-evenings in order to balance revenues with expenses. Dues stayed at the \$150 level for the next ten years, when they were increased to \$165 for the 2006-07 season. They were further increased for the 2009-10 season, to \$175, where they remain today. While operating costs and other Club expenses need to be covered, the directors have tried hard to keep dues at a level that makes membership

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affordable to all persons who wish to become members. In the light of inflation rates over the years, the cost of membership in the Club continues to be a bargain.

The governance structure of the Club has been remarkably the same since the time of its founding. Officer positions then consisted of a president, the chairs of the four standing committees (the chair of the Publications Committee was added in the 1896-97 season), a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, and a treasurer. Members holding these officer positions also made up the board of directors. Shortly after the Club's 125th year, on January 17, 2000, the by-laws were amended to create two new officer positions: historian and webmaster. Francis Lackner was elected the Club's first historian, and Manly W. Mumford its first webmaster. The bylaws were also amended on January 17 to combine the offices of corresponding secretary and recording secretary into one office that of secretary. Teresa Conway became the first holder of that position.

Program activities for our Monday-evening meetings have centered almost entirely on the presentation to the membership of a paper written by one of its members. Although this program format has remained essentially the same since the Club's founding, there were some interesting variations in the early years. There were, for example, a sprinkling of "informals" and "conversations." An informal consisted of a group of short papers by three or four members on a common subject. Each informal had an editor, who edited each paper for length and to ensure that the papers were not duplicative. A conversation consisted of a discussion by all members present at the meeting of a topic chosen and announced beforehand. Each conversation had a leader who made an opening statement on the topic and presided over the discussion. Topics tended to focus on important political, social, and intellectual issues of the day: trial by jury, public school education, tariff reform, universal suffrage, the reform of English spelling, bimetallism, and-interestinglywitchcraft and fish! Later on, the term "symposium" began to appear in the schedule of literary exercises. It is not clear how these

symposiums were structured, but most were described as symposiums on "Books of the Year."

Much later, starting in the 1950s, the schedule of exercises every year or so included a Book Night. Two or three members participated, each reviewing and commenting on a different book. (On one occasion, two members reviewed the same book, presenting opposing viewpoints.) Sometimes books, by different authors, were on a chosen subject (e.g., the Civil War, Hemingway, the 1920s), and sometimes they were on unrelated subjects. Each Book Night had a leader, who, in addition to presenting a review, selected the other participants and organized the evening. Book Nights continued to be a popular addition to the scheme of exercises well into the Club's second century, and there were years in which two, and sometimes three, Book Nights were scheduled. Starting in about 1995, however, this program format was largely abandoned. In the past fifteen years, only two Book Nights have been included in the scheme of exercises.

Although Book Nights were being scheduled less frequently, several other program formats were added to the scheme of exercises. Starting in 1996, the Club has scheduled a yearly joint meeting with the Fortnightly of Chicago. The program calls for four presenters, two from each club, each presenting a twenty-minute paper addressing a topic, usually broadly worded, which is chosen by agreement of the two clubs. Later on, starting in 2002, the Club has also held annual joint meetings with the Cliff Dwellers. On occasion, a member of each club has presented a paper, and on other occasions the program has consisted of a sole paper presented by one of our members. While not as popular with Cliff Dwellers members as our own membership, these meetings have nevertheless served to highlight the Club's longstanding relationship with the Cliff Dwellers.

Beginning in 2002, the Committee on Arrangements and Exercises scheduled a series of poetry evenings. These evenings grew out of a program announced in September 2002 (and since discontinued) for the creation of an "associate member" category providing dues-free, three-year memberships for persons "who have demonstrated talent and desire as writers." The first person selected

for membership in this category was the executive director of the Poetry Center of Chicago, and the first poetry evening was held November 11, 2002. Titled "Hands on Poetry," the program featured poems read by the Center's executive director. Poetry evenings were later scheduled for the 2004-05 season as well as the next four seasons. At the first three such evenings, poets affiliated with the Poetry Center read some of their poems, as did members of the Club. In early 2009, the Club's directors reached a consensus that participation by "outside" poets was not consistent with the Club's overall program format, and its relationship with the Poetry Center was discontinued. There were no further poetry evenings until the 2012-13 season, when the format was resurrected with membersonly participation.

In December 2007, the scheme of exercises included a Short Paper Night. The format was roughly similar to that of the series of "informals" which were held in the early years of the Club's existence. A year later, in November 2008, there was an Election Eve Program, consisting of three short papers on political subjects. This format was repeated in November 2012 in connection with the presidential election of that year. Short Paper Nights were also held in 2009, 2010, and 2011. For the 2013-14 season, a new program was included in the scheme of exercises—a Short Play Night.

Following the final meeting in May each season (held these past fifteen years at the Casino), the Club adjourns its activities until early October—a hiatus of nearly six months. Beginning in 2006, longtime-member and past-president Donald F. Wrobleski has invited members of the Club and their spouses and guests to join him for a pot luck dinner in late July or early August at his home and garden in Bannockburn. A leg of lamb is the featured main dish, with others contributing hors d'oeuvres, salads, side dishes, bread, and desserts, and with Donald himself providing what the invitation refers to as his "secret-recipe killer punch." Now in its ninth year, this summer-evening event has been a popular occasion for members to renew friendships and look forward to the resumption of Club meetings in the fall.

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The Arthur Baer Fellowship was established April 26, 1976. The first Arthur Baer Fellowship Address was presented on March 28, 1977, and with the exception of one year the Fellowship Address has been a part of the Club's program format from that time to the present. The purpose of the fellowship is to provide a one-year membership for a person "accomplished in any field of endeavor who would contribute to the interest of our meetings and be stimulating company." Fellows are expected to present a paper during the year for which they are chosen. It had also been hoped that persons selected as Arthur Baer Fellows would continue as members of the Club following their fellowship year. Over the years, a number of such persons fulfilled that hope and became active members of the Club, a list that includes present-day members William E. Barnhart, John W. Barr, William H. Beauman, C. Anderson Hedberg, Leo Melamed, and Stephen C. Crawford. Unfortunately, in recent years most persons selected as Arthur Baer Fellows have not chosen to continue their membership in the Club after their fellowship year-a result which indicates that, however good the speakers may be, the Fellowship is no longer working as originally intended.

Since 1996, our Monday-night meetings have been held at the Cliff Dwellers on the 22nd floor of the building located at 200 South Michigan Avenue. The premises were occupied by the Cliff Dwellers under a fifteen-year lease, and in October 2009 the Cliff Dwellers were notified that their lease, which expired at the end of May 2010, would not be renewed. The Cliff Dwellers subsequently obtained a two-year extension of its lease, but the extension was subject to cancellation by either party upon 120-days' notice. In the meantime, the Club's directors appointed a venue committee to track developments on the Cliff Dwellers' lease situation and also to investigate possible alternative venues for the Club if and when the Cliff Dwellers were forced to vacate their premises.

In January 2012, we learned that the Cliff Dwellers' landlord had exercised its lease-cancellation option, effective March 31, 2012. In anticipation of such a cancellation, the Club's venue committee,

chaired by Yolanda M. Deen, had been exploring other venues for our Monday-evening meetings. One such venue was the Sky-Line Club, a private club located on the top floor of the Old Republic Insurance Building at 307 North Michigan Avenue. On March 12, the Club's membership was notified that beginning April 2, and continuing through May 7, the Club would meet at the Sky-Line Club. Negotiations were also underway to secure a permanent, longterm arrangement with the Sky-Line Club for our Monday-evening meetings. As a result of the lease cancellation, the Cliff Dwellers were also then looking for new quarters.

Then, unexpectedly, near the end of March, at the eleventh hour, there was a change in circumstances regarding the availability of the Cliff Dwellers space at its present location, and the Cliff Dwellers announced that it had been able to obtain a new fifteen-year lease. The announcement also mentioned plans for leasehold improvements significantly upgrading the premises. As a result of these developments, the Club was able to resume its Mondayevening meetings at the Cliff Dwellers at the start of its 2012-13 season and to continue such meetings thereafter, with the exception of the month of January and part of February, during which renovations to the premises took place. Not only were the Cliff Dwellers and the Chicago Literary Club thus able to avoid the need to locate to new quarters, but the two organizations were also able to continue their historic, mutually beneficial relationship. As a footnote to this episode, the Club made a much-appreciated contribution to the Cliff Dwellers' fundraising campaign to finance its renovation program.

In a letter to the membership dated May 25, 2011, Club president Donald F. Wrobleski announced the initiation of a capital campaign for the purpose of providing support for the Club's activities and objectives. Although the Club had earlier solicited contributions in support of the Arthur Baer Fellowship when the Fellowship was established, and although many members had regularly made donations to the Club over the years, this campaign represented the Club's first formal effort of its kind. The members of the capital

campaign committee were William Barnhart, Anthony J. Batko, Stephen J. Schlegel, and James Thompson. The purpose of the campaign was to provide support for the programs of the Club beyond what could reasonably be accomplished with dues payments and occasional donations as well as to continue to make membership in the Club affordable to all persons who wished to become members and participate in its activities.

The capital campaign officially ended May 31, 2014. As of that date, seventy-six members of the Club had donated or pledged a total of nearly \$130,000—an amount which represents a serious commitment by the membership to the purposes and continued existence of an organization that has thrived in the Chicago community for more than 140 years. A list of the donors to the capital campaign can be found on page 51 of this supplement.

The Club's 140th anniversary was formally celebrated at the regular meeting of the Club held at the Cliff Dwellers on April 28, 2014. It was the Club's 4,530th meeting. William Barnhart presented the paper that evening, tracing and commenting on the development of the American club phenomenon that swept the country in the second half of the nineteenth century. Entitled "Clubbing," the paper may be found on the Club's website and in the Club's archives at the Newberry Library. Also, as the season drew to a close, Thomas Mullaney was working with staff members at the *Chicago Tribune's Printers Row Journal* regarding the publication of an article highlighting the Club's 140th anniversary. Entitled "A formidable milestone," the article, by a *Tribune* contributing writer, appeared in the May 11, 2014, issue of the *Journal*, in time for copies to be distributed to Club members at the closing meeting held at the Casino on May 19.

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
Starting in the late 1800s, clubs like the Chicago Literary Club were founded in Boston, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco, and other cities throughout the country. With the exception of the Cincinnati Literary Club and the Chit Chat Club

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in San Francisco, ours is the oldest surviving club of its kind still meeting on a regular basis with its original program format. Founded in 1874, the Chicago Literary Club has been in existence without interruption for 142 years. And a short eight years from now, we will be celebrating our sesquicentennial anniversary—without question, a remarkable milestone in the life of any cultural institution.

THE past twenty years have witnessed transformations in our society and our economy as the electronic revolution has altered one field after another: communications, music, commerce, travel, finance, manufacturing, and publishing—to name but a few. Those institutions that have adopted and championed new ways have prospered, even while continuing to pursue their original goals. Note the success of The Gray Lady (the *New York Times*), and of the *Atlantic Monthly* in the publishing field, both of which are well into their second century while innovating ferociously toward the future. It is an upheaval of the sort not seen since the Industrial Revolution, or more aptly, since the invention of the printing press by Gutenberg nearly six hundred years ago, and it is only accelerating.

The Chicago Literary Club began using the Internet early in its development—thanks to the foresight of Manly W. Mumford, who was a member of the Club from 1961 until his death in 2003. Manly was a president of the Club, among other offices, and delivered twenty-three papers. A nationally respected municipal bond lawyer, he was also a technophile who had an understanding of the opportunities that the Internet presented and wanted to use those opportunities for the benefit of the clubs of which he was a member. As we shall see, the Internet has transformed our communications with one another and between the Club and its members and has opened our trove of documents and history to the members and to the outside world, and in so doing, has opened our minds to new opportunities for the Club.

The World Wide Web emerged at the University of Illinois in 1995 as a variant of the computer networks that had been serving the military and academic establishments since the mid-1960s. Combined with the personal computer and the cellular telephone,

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this new structure allowed more programming freedom, making possible the growth of electronic mail, e-commerce, visually interactive websites, and all the other conveniences, resources and annoyances we now take for granted. When Manly first became intrigued by this newly popular phenomenon, in 1997, the World Wide Web was still in its infancy as a public medium. Unsure of its capabilities, he started slowly, with the adoption of the domain name chilit.org for the Chicago Literary Club (and cliff-chicago.org for the Cliff Dwellers, of which he was also a member) and the posting of papers from a few members who were enthusiastic about doing so.

Other opportunities to use this new medium soon presented themselves. As recording secretary of the Club from 1985 to 1995, I was responsible for taking the weekly minutes of meetings, noting the essayist and the topic, the members attending, and any other matters of interest. These minutes were filed in a minutes book kept in our podium at the Cliff Dwellers, but were largely ignored by the membership. In 1992, in response to a suggestion from John T. Gerlits, Jr, a past-president of the Club, I started writing a short newsletter which was published three or four times a year for members who could not attend our meetings and had no resource to stay in touch with their Club and its activities. It contained news of members, notes from the president, a list of the officers, and a brief summary of the recent papers. Sometime in 1997, Manly added the newsletter that I was publishing in a paper format to the Club's website for use by members.

I continued to write the newsletter during my term as president of the Club and until my term as chair of the Committee on Officers and Members ended, in 1997. It was thereafter discontinued, chiefly because electronic developments made it seem superfluous. After a brief hiatus, however, at the suggestion of Yolanda M. Deen and other members of the Board, I resumed writing the newsletter in 2001, and it later became the "Club Notes" that accompanied the weekly email meeting reminder then being sent to members. As time progressed, it made sense to have the Club Notes stand on their own, and so in 2009 a blog was created to share, and save, the

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weekly Notes summaries and then other materials of interest to the members. When the Club changed Internet hosts in 2014, the blog changed form once again, and it was renamed "Club News."¹

In 1997 a signal event shook one of the assumptions that Manly and I had about the nature of the Club's website. The website was started as a service to the members of the Club. Although its intent was strictly local, and although the architecture was open to the public, the assumption was that only members, friends and family members would have any interest in the contents. The error of that assumption was made clear one Monday evening in 1997 when Manly brought to the weekly meeting an email he had received from Donald Factor.

A member of the Max Factor cosmetics dynasty, Donald Factor, who was then living in London, was researching and seeking information about his black sheep uncle, John "Jake the Barber" Factor. This ne'er-do-well had been convicted of fraud and disappeared from view in the early 1940s. The prosecutor in the case, Thomas Chalfont McConnell, who was a member of this Club, had written a paper about the incident.² The paper was read before the Club on March 1, 1943, and published by the Club in July 1943. I had also read it as a Classics Night paper on January 29, 1997, and included a reference to the paper in the newsletter, which was also then being published on our nascent website by Manly. Donald Factor, in researching his uncle, had found the reference to McConnell's paper in the newsletter online and thereupon emailed Manly to request a copy of the paper for his research and for his family's archives.

Manly and I were, to say the least, surprised by this long-distance interest in our Club's archives and website, but were also excited by the curiosity it had aroused. Given the state of scanning and file conversion software in 1997, furnishing an electronic copy was a

challenge, but we finally were able to send the document to Donald Factor. This was the first indication of an interest in the work of our members by an outside audience, but it was only the first. Club papers that have since attracted outside interest include Francis H. Straus's "Tulbend," Charles Ebeling's "French Fried," John K. Notz, Jr.'s "William Le Baron Jenney," and Earle Astor Shilton's "God's Country."

Our website and the Internet have also had a direct, personal effect on my own family. This story starts with Clarence Burley, my grandfather, a fifty-year member and former president of the Club, who passed away in 1928. His progeny included a son, Clarence Burley II, who moved from Chicago to Menlo Park, California, in the early 1950s. There were also two daughters, my mother, who eventually moved from Chicago to Cedar Rapids, and her sister, who moved to Milwaukee. The Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin branches of the family (my own family constituted the Illinois branch) stayed in fairly close touch, but we lost contact with the California branch in the late 1960s. Letters and Christmas cards were returned by the post office, and further attempts at contact were thought to be fruitless. Then, one day, I received an email addressed to the webmaster at chilit.org from one of my California cousins, enquiring if anyone with my surname was still living. You may imagine my surprise at finding this long-lost branch of the family!

The Club's 125th anniversary year (1999) further fueled Manly's vision for the website, and he added to it the entire roll of members (from the inception of the Club), along with appendices listing officers of the Club and papers published by the Club (also, in each case, from the date of inception). This was a huge task, quietly undertaken entirely by Manly, which formed the cornerstone of our present online database. The posting of these materials made them available to anyone with Internet access, a huge benefit to the members and, potentially, also a service to others.

By the season of 2000-01, members of the Club began to realize that the website was of growing importance to the Club. At the same time, it was becoming apparent that greater continuity in board

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membership from year to year was needed and that the preservation of the history of the Club required more attention. As a result, early in that season, I was asked to present a proposal to change the officer structure of the board by amending the By-laws to add the posts of webmaster and historian and, also, to eliminate the largely ceremonial post of corresponding secretary. These changes were approved by the Club's members on January 17, 2000, and Manly was chosen as the first webmaster. My thanks were to be selected as the first historian.

Sadly, in the fall of 2003 Manly was stricken with a terminal illness and asked if I would complete his term as webmaster for that year. We owe a great debt to Manly as the founding genius of our website. It was his idea to provide a site for the members to use to gain access to the materials of the Club; it was his guidance that provided the focus on the written word that is still our primary thrust. It was also Manly who wrote the capsule description of the Club and its goals which may be found on a front page of the yearbook and on the website homepage.

One of the traditions of our authors has been to obscure the subject of their essays, to the greatest degree possible, in the title, revealing the subject only at the time of the reading of the essay. This is not a bibliographer's delight, and the ordeal of compiling a useful index of the papers found online is a continuing one. The first effort in this regard was the "Index of Papers Online," an attempt to categorize papers by subject matter, followed by a brief bibliographic description of the paper.

Roughly contemporaneous with the effort to so categorize our papers was the realization that I was in possession of a full set of the histories of the Club, which had generally been unavailable to others: *The Chicago Literary Club: A History of Its First Fifty Years*, by Frederick W. Gookin; *The Chicago Literary Club: Its History from the Season of* 1924-1925 to the Season of 1945-1946, by Payson Sibley Wild; *The Chicago Literary Club: The First Hundred Years*, 1874-1974; and *The Chicago Literary Club: One Hundred Twenty-Five Years*, 1874-1999. "A Twenty-Minute History of the Chicago Literary Club" by Earle Astor

Shilton and Clark L. Wagner's paper "The Club's Victorian Roots" also provide historical information about the Club. Over the course of the summer of 2005, I endeavored to copy and post on our website each of these documents,³ so that they would be available both to the members of the Club who wished to access them and to others who have found their way to our doorstep in search of information about our Club and its members.

In this connection, in January 2009 I received two surprising emails within two weeks of each other. Marc M. Cruciger of the Chit Chat Club in San Francisco wrote to inquire about literary clubs for an essay he was preparing for his club. Stephen J. Jay of the Indianapolis Literary Club, intrigued by the copy of a painting by Sir Joshua Reynolds,⁴ *A Literary Party*, which was displayed at their meetings, was also trying to track down similar information. The three of us agreed to share resources and to form an affiliation not only of our own clubs, but of other clubs with a similar purpose.

Since then, we have hosted the electronic papers of the Chit Chat Club on our website (inasmuch as they are a smaller club with more limited resources) and have also enjoyed the company of visitors from the Cincinnati Literary Club.⁵ A highlight of this association was the discovery that a non-resident member of our Club, John A. Schram, was also a member of the Chit Chat Club. Not only that, the fiftieth anniversary of his membership in our Club coincided with our 140th anniversary year. John was willing and able to present an essay⁶ and did so on November 4, 2013, in celebration of that event, at which he was introduced by his original proposer and fellow fifty-year member Leonard Reiffel.

Other developments have also been made possible by our use of the Internet. The election of new members using paper forms to collect their applications and other vitae had always been fraught with the dangers of any paper document: loss in the transfer from one coat pocket to another, dry-cleaning, and other forms of mischief. As a result, in 2011 the Club adopted a procedure for processing applications using email to distribute information and to cast ballots. The requirements for membership were not changed, but the process was shortened from weeks to a matter of days, and the information, being electronic, is now being transferred more securely.

Just as we have converted the process for electing new members to an electronic format, so, too, we have converted the weekly written reminder notice of meetings to an email. For many decades, the secretary had to arrange to have a short run of specially printed postcards, address labels, and postage stamps on hand to mail out the reminder. This task was largely taken over in the 1980s by Association Services, Inc., the Club's outside administrator, but it remained burdensome. Later, in the early years of the first decade of the twentyfirst century, the board agreed to sending the weekly reminder by email, reserving the postal card, then being sent monthly, for those without a computer. The postal reminder was finally eliminated in 2013, when all but a handful of members had access to a computer.

The website had started as a personal project for Manly Mumford, its materials created and housed on his personal computer. When responsibility for the website was transferred to me, the project undertaken by Manly continued to grow and flourish. By the spring of 2014, it became evident that the hosting firm used by the Club for over a decade could no longer meet our growing needs, and a new host was selected with greater capabilities. As we transferred our material to a new host, it was an opportunity to prepare for the future of the website and, in time, to transfer the responsibility for the website to a new generation of members. It was also a chance to provide security and safeguards for the Club's electronic resources in ways not available previously, and to take advantage of new professional services.

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It is perhaps appropriate to note that the open architecture that Manly advocated is a service to the community: our website is not locked away as a members-only website, or an academics-only university site, but is open to view for research and reading on a worldwide basis. Manly believed, and the Club has agreed, that our online papers can contribute to intellectual discussion in many fields, and that the broadest possible dissemination of our essays and history is an essential part of the Club's purpose.


For purposes of completing the record, it is important to note that the Club's interest in preserving and sharing the Club's papers predates the Internet. The Club preserved essays and books in the Club's library during the years that it leased its own rooms. While these materials were largely lost during the Depression years, the interest in preserving such materials continued. Stanley Pargellis, then the head of the Newberry Library, who became a member of the Club in 1947, initiated the practice of archiving our essays in the Special Collections Section of the Newberry, where they were available not only to our members but also to the wider community. The problem, of course, is that these papers were located in Chicago, beyond the reach of anyone not having access to the Newberry. The posting of our essays on the Club website effectively solved that problem.


In the years ahead, the challenge to the members will continue to be to "express themselves competently in English."⁷ That dictum, however, has nothing to do with the medium in which that expression is delivered; it is the process of a creative mind, and of clear thought, competently presented, that is essential. The Club will need to continue the traditions that make it a place where likeminded men and women can meet to present and discuss their ideas. It will also need to continue to appeal to its members and to a wider outside audience by judiciously adopting new technology and adapting that technology to the Club's purposes.



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
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
